What is Connecting Learning and Work?

Connecting Learning and Work: Alberta's Commitment to Career Development creates stronger linkages between education and work and provides more coordinated access to career and employment programs and services in an ever-changing labour market.

Connecting Learning and Work demonstrates how provincial government ministries, particularly Advanced Education and Technology, Education and Employment and Immigration, are working together to support the career development of Albertans from kindergarten through grade 12, to post-secondary and in the workplace.

Why do we need Connecting Learning and Work?



A skilled workforce is an important contributor to the province's strong economy and the high quality of life Albertans enjoy. The contributions of a skilled workforce are maximized through a coordinated, integrated, intentional learning and career development system.

Results of a Government of Alberta consultation with stakeholders confirmed that many people face challenges finding career information, making career decisions, accessing education and training providers, finding employment, adapting to change or moving from one job or occupation to another. As a result, stakeholders strongly supported Connecting Learning and Work for the following reasons:

- 1. **Success of our youth**. A commitment to career development is a contributing factor to increasing high school completion rates, as well as achieving easier, faster, more successful youth transitions to further learning and work.
- 2. Labour Market Demands. In the midst of fluctuating labour demands, Alberta is focusing on the efficient and smooth movement of individuals between learning and work. Information and supports are needed for all, including newcomers to the province who are eager to contribute.
- 3. **Productivity**. Efficient transitions and individuals well-matched with their learning, work and life impacts productivity and overall quality of life. Access to strong career development services and systems enhances the productivity of the workforce.

Strengths we are building upon

- The Alberta Learning Information Service (ALIS) website is the
 provincial gateway to help Albertans plan and achieve educational and
 career success. It provides information for career planning, postsecondary education and training, educational funding, job search,
 labour market trends and workplace issues.
- Refocusing and redevelopment of high school Career and Technology Studies courses and the implementation of the Knowledge and Employability courses is underway.
- We continue to raise awareness among students, parents and educators of the importance of planning for post-secondary education through initiatives such as Learning Clicks, transition kits, transition guides for students with disabilities and the Alberta Centennial Savings Plan.
- Support continues for innovative cross-ministry and community-based career development projects.
- Innovative partnerships between post-secondary institutions and K-12 school authorities are enabling high school students to graduate with a dual credential.
- Industry support for the apprenticeship and industry training system is growing and access to training is increasing.
- Improving student loans, scholarships and other forms of student assistance is ongoing.
- The Campus Alberta policy framework for the publicly funded advanced education system ensures the system is responsive to learner, economic and social needs.
- Alberta's network of 40 Labour Market Information Centres throughout the province provides career and employment services to individuals, communities and employers.

What Alberta government strategies does Connecting Learning and Work support?



Building and Educating Tomorrow's Workforce is the Alberta government's labour force strategy. The strategy's goals are to: **Inform** Albertans and employers about labour market trends and training and education opportunities; **Attract** job seekers to Alberta; **Develop** the knowledge and skills of Albertans along with innovative workplaces; and **Retain** workers in Alberta's labour market.

 The Inform theme of Building and Educating Tomorrow's Workforce is being realized through the activities of Connecting Learning and Work.
